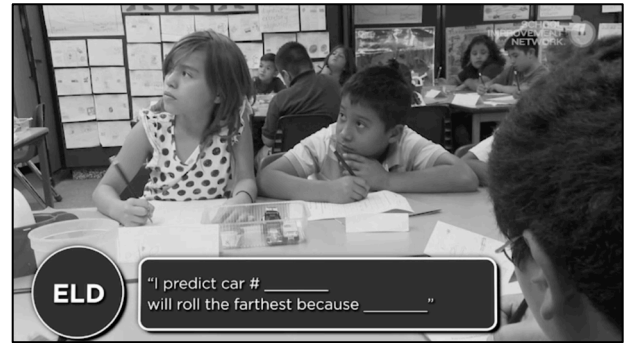
The English Language Development segments from Agua Caliente Elementary School in Cathedral City, California, feature lessons aligned to a six-stage instructional model outlined below.

Pre-Viewing Discussion Prompt

What strategies have you used to formatively assess student growth toward mastery?

Agua Caliente Six-Stage Lesson Sequence

- **Introduction:** The warm-up or anticipatory set. Teachers help activate students' prior knowledge and prepare them for new learning.
- **Input:** The teacher-led direct instruction.
- **Focus:** A quick check for understanding. Can be in the form of thumbs-up/down or fist-to-five questioning.
- **Transfer:** Students apply their new learning by working on activities or answering questions independently or in groups.
- **Evaluation:** Students report on their learning through teacher check for understanding, whole-class share-out, or presentations.
- **Extension:** Students take part in engaging, often hands-on activities that provide additional reinforcement of new knowledge.



About this Segment

“Show, don't tell” is a scaffolding strategy in which students respond to teachers' questions and instructions with non-verbal gestures. It is a quick way to support student declarative knowledge and engagement and is also used as a formative assessment strategy in which students with emerging literacy skills can indicate their understanding of content without the cognitive load of linguistic production.

1. How do the teachers in this segment effectively use “show, don't tell” in their classrooms? How else could you use this strategy in your instruction?
2. What challenges might you encounter in implementing this strategy in your own classroom?
3. What other non-linguistic strategies could you use to support your students academically?
